
FOSIL publishes this issue of *Stones Cry Out* in honor of Fr. Roger Karban.



Rabbi Sam Goldman reading the Hebrew Scripture




Fr. Bill Rowe leads the assembly in joyous song.

REMEMBERING THE BEGINNINGS

Both Marg Beckmann and Marabeth Petermeyer, who have attended Roger's Breese Scripture Class for more than 40 years, shared some thoughts on what it has meant to them. Marg briefly recalled how the decade of the '60's - a time of change in the country, in the church and in people's lives - led to their decision to attend Roger's class. "Being Cathechism Catholics, we had lots of questions", said Marg.

"That first night", Marg continued, "Roger informed us that by studying Scripture, we would learn the foundation of Christianity and what it means to be a follower of Jesus. He said, 'If you hang in there with me, you'll be transformed from Cathechism Catholics into Biblical Catholics.' Of course, at that time, we didn't understand what that meant."

"At class", Marabeth said, "we found a young, enthusiastic teacher with remarkable teaching skills, whose scholarship is profound; a teacher who could convey the meaning of a scripture passage in a way that ordinary people could understand."

"We found that the 'don't ask' atmosphere we grew up with was replaced with open discussion and dialogue. We found that it was more important to form our consciences than to define doctrine, rituals, rules and regulations. These classes were not only life-changing, but life-giving."

"Scripture is the heartbeat of Roger's life", added Marg.

"It's the application of Scripture that drives everyday of his life. As one listens to Roger read a passage in the Bible, you can hear the passion he has for the Scriptures; you can feel the rhythm and the cadence of excitement in his voice as he gently taps the page in the Bible as he reads. And then we recall the words of Jeremiah, ...it becomes like fire burning in my heart."

In conclusion, both speakers expressed gratitude to Roger for opening the windows of Southern Illinois and generously criss-crossing the Diocese of Belleville, sharing his knowledge with anyone who wants to hear. They thanked Roger for his many acts of kindness and for challenging each of us to see with new eyes; to see how God is working in our lives.

FR. BILL ROWE PRESENTED WITH FOSIL'S KATARIA AWARD



In the afternoon, Fr. Bill Rowe led the people in joyous song and praise at Roger Karban's 50th anniversary Eucharistic celebration. In the evening he was presented with FOSIL's annual Kataria Award. It was fitting for FOSIL to honor this humble and gracious man, a classmate of Roger's at the Gregorian University in Rome and ordained with Roger at the Vatican in 1964. Fr. Bill embodies the spirit and values of deceased FOSIL members, Arlou and Gus Koch, for whom the award was initiated.

Before FOSIL member, Les Himstedt, presented Fr. Bill with the award, he stated, "I recently found a quotation applicable to Fr. Bill. It's from John Newton, the author of that well-known hymn, *Amazing Grace*. He said: 'I am not what I ought to be. I am not what I hope to be. But by the grace of God, I am certainly not what I was.'

Les continued, "Fr. Bill could have made that statement his own. Why? Because the world's bishops were also in Rome for the Second Vatican Council. Besides formal theology coursework, you witnessed the momentous changes that would alter Catholic ministry - your ministry, Bill, from theological to pastoral. You are certainly not what you were when you first traveled to Rome. We are grateful for that change."

Fr. Bill, your dismissal by Bishop Braxton from sacramental ministry and pastoral parish service in Mt. Carmel is well known throughout the Belleville Diocese. Many also know that you continue to minister in a quiet, unofficial way. FOSIL takes this opportunity to publicly thank you for your ministry over the past 50 years - as military chaplain, pastor, and as a special presence within the oftentimes unjust organization we call 'church'. Despite being driven from parish and sacramental ministry, you continue to make known the good news by song, service and teaching, even without the formality of an official pulpit.

Fr. Bill, you have suffered an unjust punishment, but, following the example of the Koch's, your quiet persistence and dedication to a renewed Church is a blessing to all who know you. The Faithful of Southern Illinois proudly presents to you the Gus and Arlou Koch Katarina Award."
